The Town Dock

In the late 19th and early 20th centuries, the land where the Town Dock is now the most prominent fixture was comprised of a row of businesses, including an ice cream parlor, a post office, a livery stable, the steamboat wharf and stores. In fact it was the busiest commercial section on the Neck.

In the 1920's a few summer residents felt a yacht club was needed and proceeded to build a ramp with a float attached. There was originally a clubhouse at the end of the walkway.

In July 1948 Ed Randall, the owner of the store to the north of the dock, bought the Harpswell Yacht Club property. He ran a gasoline line down the dock to provide service to motor boats. The Town provided upkeep of the dock so as to make it available for public use. Boaters left the oars to their skiffs under the store so they would not have to cart them from home every time they needed them.

In 1952 the steamboat which brought the mail and freight from

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What's in the Historical Society Archives?


The HHS archives hold many important town documents and records dating back to before the Revolution. Stored in our alarmed, humidity-controlled, and fire-protected, vault, they reveal fascinating glimpses of Harpswell's past. Among them is the original copy of the petition to build what is now known as the Old Town Meeting House at Harpswell Center.

We the Subscribers Here of Being Assembled
Do hereby Engage that We Will Provide Good Timber
Boards Shingles and Clapboards and Nails and
Glass and Build a Meeting House forty feet
Long and thirty five feet Wide Eighteen or Nineteen feet studd
and compleatly finish the out Side of Said meeting
House and Lay a Good Lower double flower for the
Worship of God and the service of Mereconeag Neck
if the Inhabitants of Said Neck will Admitt that
We Shall Have at our own Disposal All the Ground
Plot in Said House a Ministerial Pew Except Pulpit Decon Seat three or four
Seats
in the Body on Each Side And two Seats in Each Side

in the Body on Each Side And two Seats in Each Side Gallery and Convenient Allie Room in Every Part of Said Meeting House the Whole to Builded And Down And Compleated At or Before the first Day of October Next Insuring the Date Hereof. Mereconeag March 28th 1757




Bailey Island Tuna Tournament a 73 Year Old Tradition

First started in 1939 by the Bailey Island Tuna Club at Mackerel Cove, the tournament took place this year on July 23-27 out of Cook's Lobster House. Elroy Johnson, George Johnson, John Gould and James E. Herrick were among those who conceived and started the Tuna Club, and it won early support from Maine's governor, the President of the State Senate, the Fisheries Commissioner, L.L. Bean, and many others. By 1941 the event had morphed into the Maine Tuna Tournament with state officials in charge. After a brief suspension during WWII, the tournament resumed and by 1969 was run by the new Casco Bay Tuna Club. That year, the tournament home port moved to Cook's Lobster House. It is now known as the Bailey Island Fishing Tournament. Pictures from the the tournament's earlier years are available at the Historical Society Museum at Harpswell Center

Bowdoin Students Donate Time to Historical Society

Last fall on September 17, a group of Bowdoin students put down their books, donned work clothes, and spent the day repainting the 1820 Old School House located behind Centennial Hall. They volunteered their time as part of Bowdoin's 13th annual Common Good Day program, which allows Bowdoin students, faculty, staff, and alumni to join with community members to learn about local organizations through service. We hope to host the students for work on another project again this September. HHS members are welcome to join the student volunteers on the upcoming project as well.



New acquisitions on display at the Society's Museum are:

- Room doors from the Ocean Home boarding house on Look Out Point. Each door is covered with names of people who stayed at the boarding house beginning in 1889, including including many members of the family of Benjamin F. Davis, who with four brothers later started a shoe factory in Freeport. The Ocean Home still stands and is now a private cottage. Join us at the Museum to explore the graffiti on these doors to see if you can find the name of a relative. For more information on Harpswell's many hotels in the 19th and 20th centuries, we recommend checking out the HHS website (www.harpswellhistorical.org) and the research done by Dick Mosely, a copy of which is in the Museum's library. - An 1870s era photo of Captain Elijah Kellogg Green, who died in 1901. We are looking for more information about Capt Green, who was named after Harpswell's famed preacher. (Donated by Joan Phillips)
- Memorabilia from Bailey's Store. Long-time gas boy and helper at Bailey's store, Dustin Slocum, dropped by the Museum recently and regaled us with tales of the regulars and tourists who shopped at Bailey's. Dave Hackett told Dusty a Bailey's Store story of his own. He said that one day, a tourist from out of state drove up to the store in a fancy car as Stanley Merriman was exiting. When the tourist announced that he was looking for Harpswell, Stanley answered, "Good!" and con-

- tinued walking. Please write up your own recollections of Bailey's Store for the Museum's archives.
- A 1775 Brown Bess musket made in England, test fired in the Tower of London, and used by Major Paul Randell of Harpswell. It seems that Englishman Maj. Randell, whose grave stone is behind the Old Meeting House, married Mary McFarland, daughter of a wealthy Irishman who settled at Maquoit Bay. They purchased a large tract of land where Brunswick is now located. HHS president Dave Hackett wrote more about Maj. Randell's Brown Bess in a recent issue of the Harpswell Anchor.
- A doll's bed from the 1800's. (Donated by Bill Locke)

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Portland was discontinued, and in 1956 the store was closed.

When Don Coombs bought the store in 1963, Lelia Randall gave the Town a 15 foot strip of land at the head of the dock so that there would always be public access. The store once again closed in 1968.

In 1996 Bill Randall sold the land south of the dock to Bobby Graves. This was deeded to the town in 1997 at a cost of \$25,000. This would ensure public parking for the users of the dock.

Since that time, there have been more and more people using the dock. Boaters are the primary users, both pleasure boaters and lobstermen. At one time Red Cross swimming lessons were given off the dock, and although these have been discontinued, many swimmers still jump off the float even though there is no ladder for easy access. Recreational fishermen spend time casting for whatever fish might be swimming by.

The parking area now not only services the dock, but the many people who walk to the Land Trust property at the end of Potts Point leave their vehicles there. Once in a while vehicles are left overnight by people going to nearby islands. For the last couple of years the Town has mowed the narrow grassy area. People sometimes bring their lawn chairs just to sit by the water to admire the view or spread their blankets for a picnic.

The float is often overcrowded, and the Town is now in the process of adding more float space and a ladder. The dock is one of the amenities that our summer visitors enjoy as much as year round residents.
